Top six things to know about the Arlington-Teosinte Sister City Project (ATSCP) this year:

1. Twenty-two parent volunteers work in Arlington's elementary schools to support the 4th grade curriculum about Teosinte.
2. Six of Arlington's fourth grade teachers spent a week in El Salvador last August.
3. Twenty-six youths attend high school and college with financial assistance from ATSCP.
4. The history of our friendship with Teosinte is in a book at the Robbins Library.
5. Fair trade textiles made in Teosinte can be purchased from stores in Arlington.
6. We need new volunteers!

Arlington's Fourth Grade Curriculum:

Twenty-two ATSCP volunteers work in Arlington's schools to support the fourth grade Social Studies curriculum that focuses on life in Teosinte and the importance of international friendships. The curriculum culminates with a fun, bilingual concert by Sol y Canto, bringing all of Arlington's 4th graders together at the Town Hall. The concert was funded by the town-wide PTO and a grant from the Arlington Cultural Council. With the help of the teachers who recently visited Teosinte, we are exploring different ways of expanding and improving the curriculum.

Arlington Teachers Travel to Teosinte:

Thanks to a travel grant from the Arlington Education Foundation and a private donation, six fourth grade teachers were able to experience daily life in Teosinte, learn about the history and culture of El Salvador and enhance their ability to teach the Teosinte curriculum. Having teachers, leaders and role models from our community visit and share time with our sister city continues to expand the dialogue and strengthen the connection Arlington has with Teosinte. *Please read the excerpts from two teachers' accounts at the end of this newsletter to get a flavor for their trip and to learn more about life in*

Scholarship Program:

ATSCP continues to raise money for community projects at the discretion of the Teosinte's town council. This year donations were used to support partial scholarships for 26 high school and university students. Education beyond 9th grade is extremely expensive and unfeasible for most rural families. Scholarships recipients are selected by a Committee in Teosinte comprised of town council members, parents and student representatives. ATSCP's support of education in Teosinte has helped students graduate from university with degrees such as computer science, social work, nursing and business.

Crafts from Teosinte sold in Arlington:

Fair trade crafts made by the women's sewing cooperative in Teosinte are sold at the Book Rack, Maxima Art Center and Wood and Strings. Crafts can also be purchased from ATSCP volunteers any time, contact us via email. We have wallets, purses, yoga bags, tote bags, place mats and more. Each is made from hand woven Guatemalan fabric. They make a perfect holiday gift for your friends and family and don't forget your child's teacher!

Memories from Brackett 4th grade teacher AnitaCristina Calcaterra:

We chopped down stalks with a machete, pulled off ears, piled them in a sack and began the hike down. Arriving back... we began shucking the corn. Then we sliced off the kernels and followed a neighbor down to the mashing machine. The younger children followed us, a few tweens, and a teen or two hung back to watch us all descend into the yard of a villager who had the machine. For \$.50 we mashed the corn and walked back up to the house to begin cooking (riguas)."

Excerpt from Bishop 4th grade teacher Annette Brubaker's reflections on her experience in Teosinte:

"We attended a festive welcome celebration and also got to visit the school during a school day. The children were attentive, sweet and playful. At one point they were thrilled that we six teachers agreed to go to the river with them... We swam around, slide down rocks, communicated as best we could with much laughter. On our return we were caught in a heavy downpour and several of us stopped....in one of the local homes to wait it out. What a fun time! The children taught us hand games and chants and there was much hilarity."
